THE OHIO ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

Entering its 102nd year, the Ohio Athletic Conference was once again represented well at the national level, both academically and athletically. The Conference will look to continue its prominence during the 2004-05 year.

During the 2003-04 season the OAC had 11 teams total in the NCAA "Sweet 16", including Wilmington winning the National Title in women's basketball. Mount Union finished runner-up in football and the John Carroll men's basketball squad took third overall at the NCAA Championships. Three teams finished in the "Elite Eight" at the NCAA's: Ohio Northern (volleyball), Muskingum (softball) and Wilmington (indoor track and field); and five teams ended their seasons in the "Sweet 16": Baldwin-Wallace (football), Wilmington (women's soccer), John Carroll (men's soccer, wrestling) and Otterbein (men's golf). Mount Union's Eddis Singleton and Wilmington's Emily Herring both became national champions in their respective events, 50 freestyle and the high jump.

Individually, the Conference was represented by 56 All-Americans, 32 men and 24 women, and 13 ESPN Academic All-Americans to go along with a bevy of regional and national honors for our coaches. Capital's Nici Workman was named the CoSIDA Academic All-America Team Member-of-the-Year in volleyball.

The OAC, the third oldest conference in college athletics, is predated only by the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (1888) and the Big Ten (1895). The Conference is older than the World Series and even the NCAA itself and has survived two world wars, the Great Depression, the Korean War and

the Vietnam Conflict. From a modest beginning of six charter members in 1902, the OAC grew to as many as 24 members in the mid-1920s.

Through the years a total of 30 colleges and universities at one time or another have been members of the OAC. Currently the Conference consists of 10 members, including Baldwin-Wallace College, Capital University, Heidelberg College, John Carroll University, Marietta College, Mount Union College, Muskingum College, Ohio Northern University, Otterbein College and Wilmington College. Wilmington became the 31st OAC member school, on July 1, 2000.

In the OAC's first year of existence, 1902, the first Conference champion was crowned — Case Tech won the football title with a 5-0-0 record. Outdoor track was added a year later and a third sport, cross country, became a Conference sport in 1914. More sports were steadily added to the OAC's repertoire throughout the years, culminating in the addition of women's sports in 1984. The Conference currently sponsors championships in 21 sports, 11 men's and 10 women's.

The enrollments at the 10 OAC institutions range from 1,200 to 4,500. All of the schools were founded in the 19th century and have long and outstanding academic reputations.

While maintaining these high academic standards, Ohio Athletic Conference athletic teams and athletes have consistently enjoyed a great deal of success on a regional and national level. The athletic competition is viewed not as an end in itself, but as an extension of the educational programs.

ADMINISTRATION

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR DICK REYNOLDS

Dick Reynolds, who has established himself as one of the most successful basketball coaches in the 101-year history of the Ohio Athletic Conference (OAC), brings those winning traits to his additional position of athletics director.

Reynolds, who took over the reigns of the men's athletics department in 1992, was also placed in charge of women's athletics in 1998 after Otterbein combined both men's and women's athletics into one department.

A ten-time OAC Coach of the Year selection and two-time Ohio College Coach of the Year, Reynolds has taken his cagers to at least a share of the regular-season conference title 11 times and into the NCAA Division III Tournament 13 times. The Cardinals advanced to the Final Four in 1981 and 1991 and won the national title in 2002.

He became the all-time winningest basketball coach in the OAC, surpassing Wooster's E. M. "Mose" Hole (1926-57) in 1994 and picked up his 500th career win in 2000. Reynolds has compiled a 566-307 record over 32 seasons at Otterbein.

Following graduation from Otterbein in 1965, where he was a 12-time letterman in football, basketball and track, Reynolds returned to his home town of London, Ohio, and taught seventh-grade science while serving as an assistant coach in football, basketball and track at the high school. He served three years in the U.S. Air Force (1966-69) as a personnel services officer in charge of recreation.

He spent three seasons as an assistant under Otterbein head men's basketball coach Curt Tong while teaching in the Columbus and Westerville, Ohio school districts from 1969 to 1972. He became head coach in 1972.

Reynolds and his wife, Ellen, live in Westerville. They have two children, Amanda and Chad, and five grandchildren.

COACHES



DEB TORMAN, HEAD COACH

Coach Torman, ATC, M. Ed., is a 1995 graduate of Alma College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in sports medicine. She was an all-region and all-conference second baseman with the Scots. Upon completing her master's degree in education at Bowling Green State University in 1997, Deb began her career at Ohio Northern University in Ada, Ohio, where she served as the assistant softball coach from 1995-97. From there she went on to MacMurray College in Jacksonville, Illinois, where she served as the head softball coach, head athletic trainer, senior women's administrator and instructor of health and physical education. Deb begins her seventh year at Otterbein College and has led the Cardinals to the most season wins in school history, 25, the most conference wins, 15, and the highest conference finish, second. She and her husband, Scott, and newborn daughter, Jordan, reside in Sunbury.



TRACEY CULTICE, ASSISTANT COACH

Tracey Cultice begins her first season as an assistant coach at Otterbein. While coaching, Cultice is working towards her Masters of Education and completing her certification for physical education at Ashland University.

Cultice graduated from Otterbein in 2001 with a degree in Athletic Training and Sports and Wellness Management. While at Otterbein, she was a three-year letterwinner in both softball and soccer. Cultice comes back to her alma mater after serving as an assistant coach for the Bishop Watterson high school varsity softball team.



CHRISTINE STEINES, ASSISTANT COACH

Christine Steines begins her first season as a graduate assistant at Otterbein. A 2004 graduate of Clark College in Dubuque, Iowa, Steines earned her degree in Pre-Med/Biology. While at Otterbein, she will be working towards her Masters of Business Administration (MBA).

Originally from Dubuque, Steines attended Dubuque Senior High School where she earned five letters in softball, three in volleyball, and two in both basketball and track. She continued her athletic career at Clark, where she earned four letters in softball, two in basketball, and one in volleyball.

2005 SEASON PREVIEW

Seventh-year head coach Deb Torman will field a much different team in 2004.

Otterbein returns 14 letterwinners, including seven starters, from last season's squad, which finished 17-21 overall and 8-10 in the Ohio Athletic Conference. The Cardinals opened 2004 with just two returning starters.

"I believe that our returning experience will help us to be a stronger team," Torman said. "Our team has very good chemistry and cohesiveness, which is allowing us to progress as a team. I am very excited about our squad this year."

The Cardinals batted .259 as a team last season with 130 RBIs and scored 154 runs. Otterbein was 37 of 47 in stolen base attempts.

Otterbein's ability to move runners along the base paths as well as get the occasional big hit may be a defining characteristic to this year's team.

"I believe that we will have a little bit of both power and contact hitters in our lineup," Torman said. "We are returning Alanna Fenton and Leanna Hambrick, both left-handed slap hitters, who, along with Andrea Davis, allow us to have a solid short game and to be a threat on the base paths."

Fenton, a junior utility player, batted .236 and scored 11 runs in 2004. She was third on the team with four stolen bases.

Davis, a junior second baseman, was third on the team with a .292 batting average, and shared the team lead with seven doubles. She led the team with 10 stolen bases.

"We also are returning Kristen Pawlus, Beth Rowland and Kristi Feasby, who all bring tremendous power to the plate," Torman said.

Pawlus, a sophomore utility player, led the team with a .329 batting average and was second with 21 RBIs. She recorded a .486 slugging percentage, which was second on the team, and posted a .967 fielding percentage at catcher and third base.

Rowland, a sophomore infielder, batted .266, with seven RBIs, and tied for the team lead with 23 runs scored. She was second on the team with seven stolen bases.

Feasby, a senior center fielder, batted .238, with 14 RBIs, and led the team with three home runs. She recorded a .981 fielding percentage and made just one error in 54 chances.

The Otterbein pitching staff gets a huge lift with the return of sophomore Megan Seibel. Seibel led the team in earned-run average (2.69), shutouts (4), strikeouts (53), and complete games (8). She held opponents to a .273 batting average, also a team best.

"Megan is definitely the leader of our pitching staff and we look for her to continue her success this year," Torman said. "Megan is so effective because she has tremendous control of all of her pitches. She also has confidence in herself and in her teammates to pitch to our team's strengths."

Along with Seibel, freshmen Melissa Heckel and Morgan Braun should see time on the mound.

"Melissa is a power pitcher and brings good speed along with control," Torman said. "Morgan is a control pitcher with good movement and placement of her pitches."

One of the focal points for the Cardinals this season will be improving upon their .934 fielding percentage from a year ago. Otterbein ranked eighth in the conference in fielding, committing 78 errors in 1,183 chances, but did make 10 double plays, second best in the OAC.

"We definitely need to stress solid defense this year," Torman said. "Our defense hurt us last year and we will really focus on our defensive play this year. I believe that the returning starters will help us improve upon that."

The Cardinals open their season at the Rebel Spring Games in Kissimmee, Fla. Otterbein will play 12 games during the trip, beginning with Hamilton College (NY) March 17. The Cardinals will open OAC play at home versus Wilmington Apr. 2.

"We are playing our typical non-conference schedule, which includes some power teams from the North Coast Athletic Conference in Denison and Ohio Wesleyan, along with some regionally and nationally-ranked teams on our spring trip to Florida," Torman said. "I feel that these games will really help us prepare for our OAC schedule, and we hope to be at full strength when we open conference play."

OTTERBEIN PROFILE

The College

Founded in 1847, Otterbein is an independent, co-educational four-year liberal arts college affiliated with the United Methodist Church.

Location

Westerville, Ohio, is a suburb of Columbus, the state capital.

Majors and Degrees

Courses of study are offered in 36 major fields. Degrees offered include the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music Education, Bachelor of Fine Arts in Theatre, Bachelor of Science in Education and Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Master of Arts in Education, Master of Arts in Teaching, Master of Science Degree in Nursing and Master of Business Administration. Individualized majors are also offered.

The Campus

Otterbein's 137 acre campus includes 46 buildings. Edwin L. and Mary Louise Roush Hall was dedicated June, 1993. Roush Hall is the first general purpose academic facility built on the Otterbein campus since historic Towers Hall was constructed in 1872. The college completed interior renovation of Towers Hall that included complete overhaul of classrooms, work spaces and corridors. Changes designed to recapture the essence of the time period in which Towers was built are evident throughout the facility. Physical changes to make Towers Hall more accessible, new wiring and a modern heating, ventilation and air conditioning system were included. Updated lighting, flooring, paint, restored trim and archways, network cabling and acoustic ceilings prepares the building for the classes of the new millennium. Towers Hall houses Mathematics, English, Foreign Language, History and Political Science and Religion and Philosophy departments. Other offices in Towers include

the student newspaper, Continuing Studies, the Registrar's office and the Office of Grants and Special Projects. The Towers Hall renovation was completed in April, 1999. Other facilities on campus include Courtright Memorial Library which houses more than 250,000 volumes and 1,000 periodicals as well as an outstanding modern learning resource center with access to OhioLINK and television studio. Schear-McFadden Science Hall has modern laboratories and classrooms as well as the Weitkamp Planetarium/Observatory. Cowan Hall houses theatre and speech facilities, including an expanded scene shop and WOBN-FM, the campus radio station. The Battelle Fine Arts Center is the home for programs in music, art and dance. The new Clements Recreation Center houses men's and women's athletic and physical education facilities and offices.

Students

Approximately 3,100 men and women from throughout Ohio, surrounding states and several foreign countries attend Otterbein, including more than 900 adult students in day, evening and weekend classes.

Faculty

Otterbein's student-faculty ratio of 14-to-one offers students the opportunity to receive personalized attention from their instructors. A majority of full-time faculty hold doctorates or appropriate terminal degrees. Professors are active in campus affairs, serve as advisers to students, and participate in a unique sabbatical program to research and study recent developments in their fields.

Athletics

Men and women compete in the Ohio Athletic Conference, NCAA Division III. There are eight varsity sports for men and women. A complete intramural program is available to all students.

Fraternities and Sororities

Nearly 50 percent of Otterbein students participate in the six local sororities and five local fraternities.

The Arts

Professional training programs are available in music, theatre, dance, and visual arts. There are numerous cultural events free to students, including music department events (orchestra, opera, band, choir concerts), visual arts exhibits of student and professional works, and the widely-recognized Otterbein College Theatre, with winter and summer seasons.

Off-Campus Programs

A variety of off-campus programs are available, including foreign language study in Dijon, France and Segovia, Spain. Semester at Sea, a shipboard-campus program offered in cooperation with the University of Pittsburgh, enables students to take a variety of liberal arts courses while on cruise. Study opportunities also exist with the Washington Semester Plan, operated through the American University in Washington,

D.C., the Philadelphia Center program in the Philadelphia area and Roehampton Institute in England. Army and Air Force ROTC is offered in conjunction with The Ohio State University. Internships provide experience in a student's chosen career field.

Costs

2004-2005 annual tuition is \$21,342. Room and board for one year is \$6,189.
