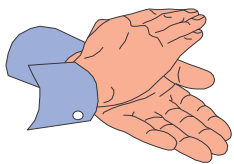

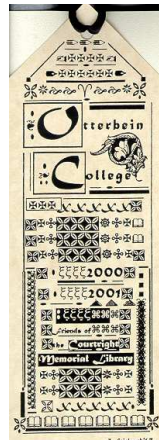
Professor Joanne Stichweh Designer of Friends 2000-2001 Bookmark

The Friends group is most grateful to Prof. Joanne Stichweh of the Department of Art at Otterbein for her gift of design for our new bookmark for the 2000-2001 academic year. She commented on what she created in a note, which I received soon after the design itself:

“I am glad that you are pleased with the design for the bookmark. Do you remember the TV commercial in which the monk has no trouble producing illuminated manuscripts instantly – he just uses a Xerox machine? That’s what gave me the idea for the bookmark. I thought it would be interesting to create something in the style of an illuminated manuscript, but to design it on the computer. The flower part of the design is hand-drawn, but the rest utilizes various fonts from my computer. Thank you for offering me the challenge and opportunity to try my hand at designing.”

Prof. Stichweh is an alumna of (B.A. 1967), with majors in Visual Arts and Spanish. She holds a M.F.A. degree from the Ohio State University,



granted in 1969. Since 1980 she has taught at Otterbein, holding at present the rank of Associate Professor. She served as Acting Chair of the Department of Art in the Spring of 1990 and again during the 1996-1997 year. From 1984 to 1991 she was Lecturer in Art History at the Pontifical College Josephium, concurrently with her Otterbein appointment.

Her service to Otterbein has been and continues to be extensive. An early supporter of the Integrative Studies program, she regularly teaches a Freshman Seminar in that department “Images and Ideas: Responding to Art,” as well as I.S. 310, “Art and Human Nature.” In her home department, she teaches a wide range of courses, including the three-term Art History Survey, and Drawing, Design and Painting courses. She taught “Women Artists in History” for the first time in 1995. In June of 1999 she received Otterbein’s “Master Teacher of the Year” award.

On campus her service has included the College Honors Program, the Women’s Studies Festival Planning Group, the Women’s Forum Steering Committee, the Academic Honors Convocation Committee, the Philomathean Room Committee, the Integrative Studies Advisory group, the Library committee, and numerous exhibition committees through the years.

The list of her professional and organizational memberships is long, representing her many interests. She is a frequent campus guest lecturer in Integrative Studies, History, English and other classes, and has made many guest appearances off campus for academic, religious and art-oriented groups. Several of her paintings and drawings have appeared on the cover of textbooks (such as “The Very Rich

Hours: Icarus and Capricorn” on the cover of Women, Culture, and Society, Fonow, Allan, Bailey, eds., Simon and Schuster, 1997), and within various books and journals. Listing of her work at exhibitions (along with her awards) covers more than four single-spaced pages. These on the list range from Otterbein College exhibitions to the Ohio State Fair, the juried exhibition of the Columbus Art League, the East Central Colleges Consortium Faculty Art Show, and one person exhibitions at the OSU Faculty Club and the Ohio University—Lancaster Campus.

Prof. Stichweh’s contributions to community service are many, including work for the Seal of Ohio Girl Scout Council, for the “Art for Life” auction for the benefit of the Columbus Aids Task Force, and numerous projects for secondary schools in central Ohio.

The above represents only small selections from the impressive list of accomplishments the name Joanne Stichweh represents. I thank her for the ever-willing spirit, which led her to add the Friends of Courtright Memorial Library to the groups – artistic, academic, and charitable – for which she has done so much. Thank you, Joanne, beyond what words can express, for your bookmark design given to all of us.

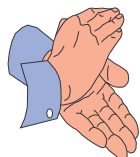
A Penny for your thoughts ...or your Library!!

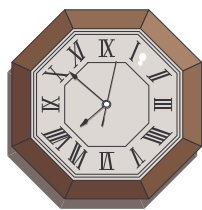
Darrel Poling:

April 14, 2000

Following a meal of real and vegetarian lasagna 121 members and guests of the Friends of the Library enjoyed Tom Szudy's play, "Midnight at the Millennium" with dessert. Afterwards, prizes were awarded for knowing everything there is to know about Alfred Hitchcock, "Birds", "The Lady Vanishes" and North by Northwest (to say nothing about "The Lodger").

The crowd diminished greatly before the taking up of necessary business. President Sylvia Vance read Joanne Stichweh's statement concerning the 2000 FOL bookmark. It was suggested the statement appear in the next issue of the newsletter.

Reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting was dispensed with since they had already been published and no changes were demanded.

Prior to the report of the Nominating Committee (Patti Rothermich and Joanne VanSant) Joanne VanSant extended a hearty thanks to the retiring Council members. The following slate (without nominations from the floor) was moved for unanimous election by Marilyn Day, seconded by Phyllis Tillett. The room murmured consent.

Waid Vance presented the proposed revision to the by-laws of the organization. Copies of the new by-laws with correction noted were distributed. After brief discussion Paul Burnham moved, Beth Daugherty seconded passage of the modified by-laws. Motion carried without dissent.

Lois Szudy presented the Treasurer's report. March balance in the FOL account was \$7209.17. Several

suggestions were floated for possible use of the FOL funds, including donation to the penny campaign for sturdy outdoor furniture, re-upholstery of inside furniture, and a P. A. system to facilitate all-library communication and emergency announcements and installation of automatic doors at the main entrance. Esther Barnhart moved, Jane Miller seconded that approximately \$5000 be expended on procurement and installation of a library-wide Public Address system as soon as possible. Motion passed unanimously.

Mellissa Dardinger was introduced along with the designs for an FOL logo and letterhead, as well as a brochure layout for information and educational purposes.

Sylvia expressed her gratitude for such a fine working relationship with Lois. Joanne again expressed appreciation to Sylvia for the two years hard work that she has dedicated to the Friends.

Phil Barnhart moved and Waid Vance seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The vote was not unanimous, but passed anyway.
