QUALIFICATIONS: Ph.D. (Assistant Professor rank, Tenure-track) or Master's degree (Instructor rank, Non-tenure-track) in Multimedia Journalism, Video Production, Mass Communication or related field with a record of effective teaching and professional and industry experience. Candidate should be proficient in teaching students how to edit on Final Cut Pro and Avid systems. Knowledge of Adobe Creative Cloud is a plus.

RESPONSIBILITIES: Responsibilities include teaching required video production and multimedia journalism courses, contributing to the teaching of other courses that serve majors in Journalism and Media Communication, Public Relations, Health Communication and Communication Studies as well as the Sports Communication minor, performing service duties, and maintaining professional productivity. Teaching would primarily focus on video and digital media production in a lab environment. As part of the teaching load, the candidate will recruit, train and advise students to assist with campus video productions including live sports coverage in combination with student media. Candidates should be prepared to contribute to curriculum development emphasizing multi-platform storytelling.
