In addition to learning a lot of handy skills working in the theatre shop, participating on the debate team provided me with the benefit of learning to think and speak convincingly "on my feet" which helped me greatly in my future career.

My career plans changed again, as I wanted to become a school speech pathologist, starting grad school in January, 1974. However, OSU eliminated that specialization, so I went to Dean Van for advice. She suggested I consider Bowling Green's College Student Personnel program. So, I got my MA degree, worked as a Residence Hall Director at Bowling Green for two years and then moved to Tampa, Florida for a "year off" (that turned into 17 years!) I was hired at a large Tampa law

firm as a paralegal, which led to my becoming the firm's first Personnel and Legal Recruiting Director. Non-lawyers recruiting and helping develop lawyers' supervisory skills was a relatively new profession and provided me an opportunity to create and grow "on the job". I was involved with the National Association for Law Placement, eventually serving on its Board of Directors for two terms, which was a terrific experience.

In 1992, I was in Columbus recruiting law clerks at Ohio State and met friends for dinner in Dublin. That night, I also met my future husband, Patrick Scanlin (who is not a lawyer!), leading to my move to Columbus and our 1994 wedding. I worked as a legal administrator for a firm in Columbus, and after a few years decided I wanted "something different". I was fortunate to find a human resources position at Nationwide Insurance and after a couple of years, was asked (ironically!) to work with their legal department's Trial Division (900 attorneys & staff across the country). After 21 years at Nationwide, I retired in 2018.

That's my Otterbein Story....thank you Otterbein for introducing me to the Business of Travel.

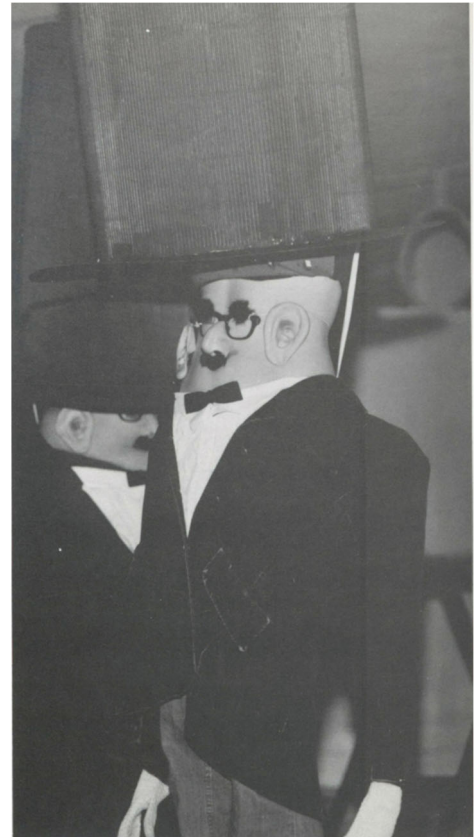
One last "Favorite Memory"... And this may have made the Yearbook...

## Mike Wasylik

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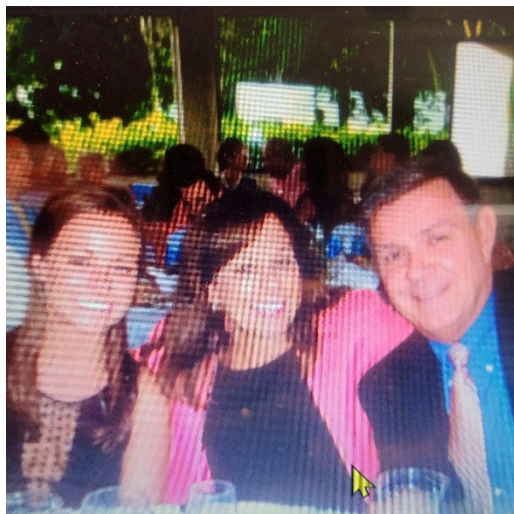
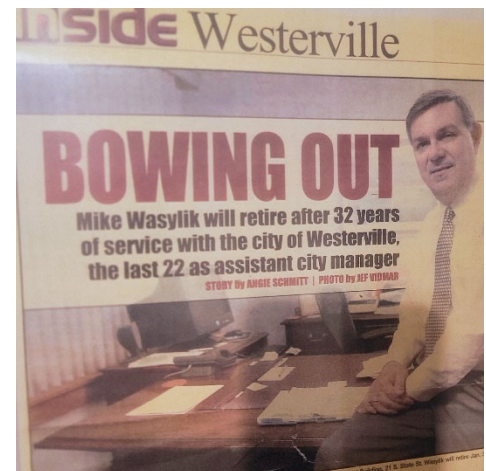
