Q: What was your favorite Otterbein tradition?

Q: What was the best class you took, and why?


THE FUTURE IS HERE

The Point is where education, industry, community, and innovation meet. The purpose of this place is to give students the opportunity to test their knowledge in real-world situations. Whether partnering with start-up entrepreneurs to help them develop a medical device prototype or helping conduct cutting-edge fintech research for global industry partners — the pairing of academics with real-world applications is the Otterbein model for a 21st century liberal arts education. This is experiential learning at its best.



THE SCIENCE OF ART

An Otterbein chemistry professor is using science to decode stories hidden within textiles, art and artifacts. Joan Esson's students have studied everything from Western African artifacts to actual paint samples from Leonardo da Vinci's "The Last Supper." Esson also analyzed Central American natural dyes and supported another colleague's work that could reveal more about how Vincent Van Gogh may have influenced Paul Gauguin when the two painted together. Esson leads a study abroad course to Italy where students explore the preservation of cultural heritage while studying in Milan, Vencie, and Florence. This is the science of fine art.



HISTORY OF INNOVATION

Otterbein's Integrative Studies (INST) program proudly stands as a nationally recognized general education curriculum. Celebrated as a ground-breaking model when it originated in 1969, Otterbein's INST approach ensures students build a broad and deep knowledge base that equips them as lifelong learners and problem-solvers. Anticipating and evolving with industry needs and a global economy, the INST program teaches students how to build connections between courses, cocurricular activities, and their personal and professional lives. It truly is a smarter way to learn. The best testament to that truth is the number of universities now deciding to follow Otterbein's lead.





HOME TO CHAMPIONS

The Austin E. Knowlton Center for Equine Science stands as a state-of-the-art academic, economic, and recreational facility for Otterbein's nationally recognized Equine Science program. It also serves as the home to Otterbein's Equestrian Team. Equestrians have the opportunity to ride and compete in a variety of disciplines – Eventing, Hunter/Jumper, and Dressage – allowing students to meet their competition goals. In 2022, the Dressage team celebrated its second consecutive Intercollegiate Dressage Association (IDA) national championship, while the Hunter Seat team won its Intercollegiate Horse Show Association (IHSA) zone and regional titles.



HOME TO ADVOCATES

Desmond Fernandez '21, a BFA acting alumnus, organized several Westerville-based Back Lives Matter protests in the summer of 2020 as a student. He was honored with the Alston Award at Westerville's 2021 Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration. The award recognizes a member of the Westerville community that has embodied and lived out the ideals of Dr. King. "This is my time to be a part of this mission to better our community and make it even more diverse and more inclusive." Fernandez said. Fernandez also worked with Otterbein and Westerville leaders to establish a community non-profit aimed at fighting racism.







Otterbein offers a diverse and exciting array of awards that **ensure students can earn scholarship support** for their talents, leadership, involvement, interests and potential.

MERIT SCHOLARSHIPS:

Awarded to students who have demonstrated scholarship and leadership in high school. Consideration for these awards is based on a student's overall application for admission. These scholarships are renewable for up to four years.



PRESIDENT'S SCHOLARSHIP* \$17,000 - \$18,000: Typically awarded to students with a high school GPA > 3.75, or students with a HS GPA > 3.5 and/or are in the top 15% of their class, *and* have an ACT composite of 24 or higher (SAT 1180 EBW & M). **Four year value \$68,000 - \$72,000.**

PROVOST SCHOLARSHIP* \$14,000 - \$15,000: Typically awarded to students with a high school GPA > 3.2, or students with a HS GPA > 2.95 and/or are in the top 40% of their class, *and* have an ACT composite of 21 or higher (SAT 1080 EBW & M). **Four year value \$56,000 - \$60,000.**

ALUMNI SCHOLAR AWARD* \$12,000 - \$13,000: Typically awarded to students with a high school GPA > 2.75, or students with a HS GPA < 2.75 *and* have an ACT of 18 or higher (SAT 970 EBW & M). **Four year value \$48,000 - \$52,000.**

ADVANTAGE PARTNERSHIP SCHOLARSHIP* \$19,000:

Awarded to new first year or transfer students at time of admission in lieu of other merit awards for students under the age of 23 whose parent or guardian is a qualified employee of an Otterbein Advantage Partner. OTTERBEIN SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS:

These scholarships require students to apply by Dec. 15.***

Otterbein offers a full slate of competitive scholarships to recognize student achievement. All scholarships are awarded for full-time study for four years as long as academic requirements are fulfilled. Scholarships awarded by Otterbein can never exceed the value of tuition (\$33,824).

COMPETITIVE SCHOLARSHIPS***

- Full Tuition Scholarships Otterbein awards three full tuition scholarships through an essay competition. The value of this award replaces all other Otterbein aid. By invitation only.

ACADEMIC INTEREST SCHOLARSHIPS

STEM Scholarships FAFSA and interview required.

- Cardinal Science STEM Scholarship \$4,500 to \$10,000 Awarded to students admitted for full-time study in Biology, Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, Chemistry, Engineering, Environmental Science, Physics or Zoo and Conservation Science. Must have a minimum HS GPA of 3.0 and be low-income. Renewable with 3.0 GPA and must remain in qualifying majors.
- Choose Ohio First STEM Scholarships up to \$8,500 Awarded to Ohio residents admitted to the Chemistry, Environmental Science, Engineering Physics, Math, Nursing, Physics, or Systems Engineering majors. Preference given to low-income, first generation and underrepresented students. Renewable with 3.0 GPA and must remain in qualifying majors.

- Choose Ohio First Computer Science Scholarship- amount varies Preference given to students typically under-represented in Computer Science, including women, students of color and low-income students. Renewable for two additional years.
- Wiese Engineering Scholarship amount varies Awarded to new students with an Engineering major.

Humanities Scholars \$1,000 to \$3,000 Awarded to admitted Humanities students who live in the Creativity & Culture Living Learning Community or Honors housing. May be renewed for up to eight semesters as long as enrollment in a Humanities major is continued. Not eligible for students with Creative Writing Talent award or Music participation awards. Interview required.

OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS:

- Ammons Thomas Award \$1,000 to \$3,000
 Offered to multicultural students who exhibit both strong scholarship and leadership. Consideration for this award is based on student's overall application for admission.
- Sibling/Legacy Award \$1,000 Offered to new First Year students whose parent or grandparent is an Otterbein Alumna/Alumnus or who have a sibling concurrently enrolled.
- Otterbein United Methodist Ministerial Grants \$500 to \$7,000 Awarded to Otterbein students whose parent or guardian is a United Methodist Minister and who has unmet financial need. Replaces all other Otterbein need-based aid. FAFSA Required.

Service to Country / Veteran Status

Priority Scholarship Deadline

- Otterbein Honoring Service Scholarship \$19,000 Awarded to recipients of Folds of Honor award or the Ohio War Orphans Scholarship. The value of this award replaces other Otterbein merit aid. Four-year value \$76,000.
- Yellow Ribbon Scholarship Otterbein is proud to participate in the Yellow Ribbon GI Educational Enhancement Program which allows eligible veterans to attend tuition free. Eligible Post 9/11 GI Bill veterans may also transfer their unused educational benefits to their spouses or children.

Talent and Participation Awards

\$500 to \$26,000 All talent and participation awards require a separate audition, portfolio review, interview, and/or essay. Talent awards require student to major in department that offered the award. Limit of one talent award per student. Renewal criteria set by department; student must remain in major in the awarding department. The scholarship applies after all federal and state aid has been

applied, including the federal Direct Student loan. The Opportunity Scholarship does not cover room and board or books.

> NEW! FAFSA COMPLETION AWARD** \$1,000

We believe that filing the FAFSA is so important to understanding your financial options that we created a new \$1,000 completion award.

Some families assume they won't qualify for aid, so they don't bother completing the FAFSA. You might be surprised to learn that students who were admitted for Fall 2022 and filed the FAFSA received, on average, \$3,732 more than non-filing families.

Awarded to all new first year students who apply and **submit the FASFA to Otterbein by January 15**. This award is renewable for four years as long as students continue to submit the FAFSA by January 15 each year. This is not a need-based award. **FAFSA is required.**


